


The Lutheran Church of Our Saviour The Communicator—April 2024

From The Desk of Pastor Wilck

One of the greatest preachers of the last century was the reverend Phillips Brooks, Episcopal Bishop of Massachusetts. On July 4th, 1880, he preached a powerful sermon in London's Westminster Abbey. The sermon's theme was built around the candle as a commanding symbol of the Easter life. Human nature, Brooks declared, is like an unlit candle, dim, cold, waxy and rigid. But when the candle is lit, something happens, bringing warmth and light to the darkness around it.



The message of Easter is this: human life is a candle to be lit. Christ, the light of the world, has risen from the dead, and calls all people to the resurrection faith that transforms their lives. The resurrection is like a lighted candle burning brightly with a light that guides and cheers them through the darkness of this world. "The human spirit" said the writer in proverbs, "is the lamp of the Lord." (Proverbs 20:27)

The first witnesses to the resurrection were the women who went to the tomb at early dawn. They were perplexed by what they found, the stone rolled away and the body gone. Their perplexity turned to fright when they met two men in dazzling apparel who asked them the best question in all the gospels: "why do you seek the living among the dead?" (Luke 24:5) Suddenly, the light began to dawn. Jesus had risen, as he had told them.

When the candle of faith is lit, its fire must first warm the rigid, waxy fears that prevent us from believing. Often, this takes time.



The reaction of the women moved from fear to faith, as does ours when the resurrection is announced. We, too, are afraid to believe what goes against the grain of all human logic. It was the same with the other disciples. The text ends on a note that doesn't surprise us, but these words seemed to them an idle tale, and they did not believe them. But faith soon came, the candle was lit, and the light of the resurrection shone brightly, overcoming the darkness around it.

Each day is a resurrection day when we celebrate the light that God kindles in each believer, a candle burning brightly with Christ's glory.

This year Maggie has been invited to be the guest speaker at Valparaiso University in Indiana and she will be able to bring some of the children with her. Maggie will be in need of money to help with transportation to and from the University. Details are still in the planning stages with the University. We will provide more information about how we might be able to help as we get it.



Congregational Meeting submitted by Steve Brady, Council President



Organ Committee submitted by Jonathan Howell



When the church was first built it was designed to hold a small pipe organ. The closets in the loft were built to house the chests where the pipes were to go. But due to cost overruns a small pipe organ was not put in. The church made do with a piano for a while, followed by a small house organ donated by a member of the church. In the early 80's monies were raised to purchase a slightly used Allen Electric Organ which came off the assembly line in 1979. This is the organ which currently serves Our Saviour Church.

Over the last several years it has started to deteriorate.,

some of the hard wired batteries inside the organ fried and needed to be replaced, as well as some other assorted parts. When our previous short-time organist Nicholas Cantello arrived he notice issues with the organ and brought them to our attention. There were various hums and rattling noises and some of the electronic stops were stuck on a volume and couldn't be adjusted with the swell peddle. And in general the overall quality of sound was poor.

Gary Shipe a technician and salesperson from Allen Organ Buffalo was called in to take a look. His recommendation was that we consider a replacement. He did the best he could to fix a few of the items, but informed us that the speakers were in a state of decay, and that the power supplies could go at any time. He advised that although we could swap out fried parts as they become unusable, the expense would not be cost effective. "It's like a car that reaches that point where everything starts to go."

For it's time, that organ was a wonder. And although true organ lovers found it inferior to a real pipe organ in quality and authenticity of sound it has served this church well. Since the late 1970's however technology has changed drastically. A small keyboard you can purchase for a child at Walmart has more sophisticated hardware than our current organ.

Over the last 2 years we have had to do several searches for organists. One of the first people we spoke to was Allesio Giacobone, the organist who played for our summer services. He is an internationally recognized composer and organist. When approached about an organist job here his comment was, "I think you will have a hard time attracting organists because of the instrument."

This past December we hired Lucas Myers. Lucas is a wonderfully gifted pianist who majored in piano performance and minored in organ. , he has been accompanying our services on a very nice upright piano that was built to be used in someone's living room, not to be the primary instrument in a church space. The baby grand piano brought over from Reformation church is lovely, but according to our piano technician Bill Verity, needs about \$1800 of work to have the hammers re-felted, shaped, and adjusted.

So, that brings us to the question of what to do next? If we want to continue to grow our music program and provide high quality accompaniments we have reached a point where the church needs to consider making an investment in it.

The technology of the new Allen Electric Organs is amazing. You can not tell the difference between it and a pipe organ except that it is more versatile. They are not only capable of mimicking famous organs from a variety of countries and time periods, but also orchestral instrument sounds. They contain pre-programmed hymn accompaniments, and even preludes and postludes.

The organ that I personally would love to see the church invest in is currently in a church in Amherst NY. We have been invited to take a field trip to hear it and attend a demonstration. We would like to form a committee to start exploring all of this. We need your help. Please consider being a part of this exploratory committee. Please speak to Jonathan Howell or Pastor Wilck if you can help on that committee.
