What is Advent?

Advent is a four-week season dedicated to reflective preparation for the arrival, "advent," of Jesus Christ's Nativity at Christmastime as well and Christ's expected return in the Second Coming. During this important event on the church calendar, each week of Advent focuses on a different theme - hope, peace, joy, and love. Christians from all denominations and backgrounds celebrate Advent in different ways but all focus on the anticipation of waiting for the arrival of Jesus.

"Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name Immanuel." Isaiah 7:14

What Does Advent Mean?

In Christianity, Advent refers to the period of four weeks leading up to Christmas. It begins on the Sunday closest to November 30 (St. Andrew's Day) and ends on December 24. It is a time of anticipation and preparation for the celebration of the birth of Jesus Christ on Christmas Day.

Some people may know that the Advent season focuses on expectation and think it serves as an anticipation of Christ's birth in the season leading up to Christmas. This is part of the story, but there's more to Advent.



The word, "Advent," is derived from the Latin word adventus, which means, "coming," or "arrival," which translates to the Greek word <u>parousia</u>. Scholars believe that during the 4th and 5th centuries in Spain and Gaul, Advent was a season of preparation for the baptism of new Christians at the January feast of Epiphany, the celebration of God's incarnation represented by the visit of the Magi to the baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1), his baptism in the Jordan River by John the Baptist (John 1:29), and his first miracle at Cana (John 2:1). During this season of preparation, Christians would spend 40 days in penance, prayer, and fasting to prepare for this celebration; originally, there was little connection between Advent and Christmas.

By the 6th century, however, Roman Christians had tied Advent to the coming of Christ. But the, "coming," they had in mind was not Christ's first coming in the manger in Bethlehem, but his second coming in the clouds as the judge of the world. The Advent season was not explicitly linked to Christ's first coming at Christmas until the Middle Ages.

What Does Advent Symbolize?

Advent symbolizes the church's present situation in these "last days" (Acts 2:17, Hebrews 1:2) as God's people wait for the return of Christ in glory to consummate his eternal kingdom. The church is in a similar situation to Israel at the end of the Old Testament: in exile, waiting and hoping in prayerful expectation for the coming of the Messiah. Israel looked back to God's past gracious actions on their behalf in leading them out of Egypt in the Exodus, and on this basis, they called for God once again to act for them. In the same way, the church, during Advent, looks back upon Christ's coming in celebration while at the same time looking forward in eager anticipation to the coming of Christ's kingdom when he returns for his people.

In this light, the Advent hymn "O Come, O Come, Emmanuel" perfectly represents the church's cry during the Advent season:

O come, O come, Emmanuel, And ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here Until the Son of God appears. Rejoice! Rejoice!

While Israel would have sung the song in expectation of Christ's first coming, the church now sings the song to commemorate the first coming and expects the second coming in the future.



Eventually all food items that had been coming into the church for several days were loaded and the crew headed off to Maggie's to prepare for the next days dinner. How did it turn out? There is an awful lot of giving going on here! Did you know we raised over \$3000 for Hurricane Relief! Wow! As you walk through the Narthex you can see evidence of the generosity of the members of Our Saviour. The Angel Tree which Jerry set up is bare. All the tags have been picked up and many bags of gifts already surround the base of the tree and are ready to be delivered to Coldwater House for Women and Children. So far people are following the directions of not wrapping the gifts, but putting them in a gift bag instead, along with the ID tag. You may notice there are blank envelopes next to the tree for last minute cash or check donations. Fortunately there is still some time to contribute as the deadline is December 15th.

PB&J Sign up sheets are on the Narthex table and many have signed up to continue the mission to make 200 sandwiches a month. The next opportunity for this type of giving is December 12th at 9:30 a.m. Our Cornucopia food drive has been ongoing and we will continue to collect food till December 8th. The women of WELCA pitched in and provided gift cards to thankful families. Following the collection of food items, we will deliver them to St. Theodore's Food Pantry. The need is great this year. Our church receives phone calls daily with struggling people looking to find sources of food help. The increases in the recent immigrant influx has put additional strains on food pantries and other services in our area. Just yesterday a family from Cuba arrived at our door, having just come over the border from Mexico. They were bused to Rochester and had lost the paper telling them the address of where to go for help. The only info they had was that they thought it said "Lutheran." Google had sent them here to Our Saviour.

Using our cell phone to translate we tried to help figure out where they should go, but ultimately, they thanked us and headed out to the bus stop pulling their suitcases behind them. We pray they found their way... The need certainly is great.



Speaking of WELCA, what a busy November they had! Election Day was a zoo here at the church. There was quite a good turnout for Voting and the ladies put out quite a spread for the Annual Election Day Soup and Bake Sale. Many voters took advantage of the delicious pulled pork sandwiches and wide ranging soup selection, not to mention all the wonderful cookies, cakes and other confectionaries. There were plenty of smiles from the voters, many of which came to vote on their lunch break and were grateful to purchase something to eat. And the women were grateful too, having raised \$866 through this effort and with sponsorship from Thrivent for whom we are grateful.

After all that hard work, WELCA will now turn to celebration as they gather at the church on December 10th at 11:30 a.m. for their annual Christmas Luncheon. Secret Pals will be revealed and new ones picked for the coming year. Lunch will be provided, but ladies can also bring a dessert or snack to



Many groups are busy preparing for the Advent and Christmas Season. The Altar Guild has a lot to get ready. Jennifer Large submitted her order to stock up on candle oil. Cheryl Stone took an inventory of wafers and wine and provided the Finance Committee with her projected budget needs for 2025. On December 7th at 9:30 a.m. she and the other members of the Guild will gather in the Narthex to prepare for Christmas. There is polishing to be done, candles to be prepared and many other tasks to complete. The church relies on them to make sure we have everything we need to prepare for Christ's coming at Christmas... and they can always use more help, if you have some time on your hands.



Are we getting the word out? Well, we are trying. In an effort to improve communications inside and outside the church, the Council voted to create a new Communications Committee. For the last many years monies have been budgeted for mass media. Much of these funds were spent advertising for our services in the Penny Saver. It was determined by the committee that this was not the most effective way to let the outside world know who we are. With limited resources the decision was made to focus on making the church look festive and beautiful from the road for the Advent/Christmas Season. The musical changes that each season bring are refreshing and hopefully inspiring as well.

Our Saviour music program suffered a major setback in November. It happened on a Sunday morning. As the Bell Choir was playing the prelude, Lucas turned the Organ on to get ready to play the opening hymn. Suddenly through the array of speakers across the back of the church came the most horrible sound. The congregation gasped because it was so loud. Some thought it was just some feedback from the sound system but we didn't get off that easy. The main power supply and amplifier of the organ had just perished. The lights came on but no buttons worked and it made no sound.

Gary Shipe from Allen Organ is currently working on sourcing a replacement part for the organ, but at its present age of 60 years we will have to weigh whether or not it's worth it or not to fix. We will keep the congregation apprised of what we learn about that. In the meantime, we have used some of our special music funds to purchase an electric synthesizer keyboard which has the ability to provide sounds of many instruments for our worship experience.



The church has also hired a new soprano section leader. Nadia Shaw is a high school senior from Greece, NY and a private voice student of our music director Jonathan Howell. You will soon be hearing her soaring voice helping to lift the choir to new heights. She is also preparing a special rendition of, "O Holy Night." to be sung on Christmas Eve. We are delighted to have her with us.



Have you noticed children running around! For years we have been praying for more families with children to attend church, and that is beginning to happen. God answers prayers. The word is getting out. The Sunday school teachers are working very hard to provide high quality religious education for our young people. Special activity days on the first Sunday of every month are continuing, and although Sunday School will be in recess on December 29th, the children will present a new church banner to the congregation on January 5th. Also, on December 8th, Diane Parke/Potter will have the children do some bell ringing before she heads off to the sunny shores of Hawaii.



And you don't have to be a kid to learn something at Our Saviour. Pastor Wilck is offering bible study on the Sundays of Advent which will cover the lessons of the day in depth. Pam Spencer continues to facilitate the Alpha Course, which is an excellent way to begin a conversation about our faith. If you know someone who is in the "search phase," of their faith journey, you should bring them to Alpha. The Christian Book and Movie club will meet in January, but now is the time to get a copy of the book "Lifemark," by Chris Favre. It deals with topics of faith, adoption and parenting.



What is a QCD all about?

Taxpayers who are age 72 (prior to 12/31/22) have the option to transfer up to \$100,000 to charity tax-free each year. For those who turned 72 on or after 1/1/23, the minimum age for this tax free charity contribution is 73 years of age.

What to do:

- 1. Contact their IRA trustee. The QCD is tax-free as long as distributions are paid directly from the IRA to an eligible charitable organization.
- 2. Distributions can be made electronically, directly to the charity, or by check payable to the charity.
- 3. An IRA distribution such as an electronic payment made directly to the IRA owner does not count as a QCD. Likewise, a check made payable to the IRA owner is not a QCD.
- 4. You do not have to itemize deductions to qualify for this benefit. The amount given to charity is reduced directly from taxable income when you file your taxes. The 1099-R that you receive from your IRA trustee includes the total required minimum distribution (RMD) including QCD's.
- 5. Like other IRA distributions, QCD's are shown on line 4 of Form 1040. If part or all of an IRA distribution is a QCD, enter the total amount of the IRA distribution on line 4a. Then, the amount of the taxable portion (total IRA distribution less QCD) is entered on line 4b. Enter "QCD" next to line 4b. This reporting information applies to 2022 taxes. Future years may have different rules or different lines on form 1040.
- 6. Make sure that you have a receipt. The receipt must state the date and amount of the contribution and indicate whether the donor received anything of value in return. (See Publication 526 available on IRS.gov. For more information about this topic, see IRS.gov, Publication 590-B.

If you have any questions, contact your tax professional. Tax preparation software such as TurboTax does a good job walking you through this topic.
