

When the Bible records of Jesus public ministry are read, we cannot help but wonder about what sort of people he identified with.

Jesus had a fascination with all. All was a very big word to him. The vision of his mission was, "and I, when I am lifted up from the earth, will draw all people to myself." He knew he had come for all. On the night of his birth, an Angel told some scrubby shepherds that his coming to earth was, "good news of great joy for all the people."

It was his all-inclusive love that irritated those who had selectivity screens about people.

To Jesus, loving all became a matter of death and life. He came to seek and save sinners, like prostitutes and pharisees. What sort of people were they? Sinners, both of them. One knew it and wept over the gift of Jesus. She lavished her gratitude and left with the liturgical dismissal of grace: "go in peace" (Luke 7:50). Later, Jesus, looking over Jerusalem, would weep over the city saying: "if you, even you, had only recognized on this day the things that make for peace! "(Luke 19:410)

Christians have sensed the calling to express the all-inclusive, peace-offering love of Christ. It still irritates. For we all are being changed.

The danger is to think we will only be changed sociologically. Jesus, however, knows what sort of people we all are: sinners, bent on living for ourselves. We, of both genders, of all ages and social conditions, are sinners by thought, word, and deed, who love neither God nor neighbor as we ought. An inclusive church lavishly extends the invitation to hear what sort of God loves us all: One who forgives our sins, changes our lives, and sends us forth in peace with good news to tell everyone! It's hard to believe that I am writing an article that will be published for the June Communicator. This means that we are at the halfway point of the calendar year – it's hard to believe that summer is here! I thought it might be appropriate to give some high level overview of how things are going from my perspective. By the way I am a glass half-full person, and there is much to celebrate and share for what has transpired so far in 2024. Here are three thoughts:

- 1. Attendance is up this year over last year and our giving is ahead of schedule! This is great news that we should celebrate! However be aware that the summer season is right before us and that we need to continue supporting Our Saviour with our attendance, talents, and financial gifts during the summer months.
- 2. We are pleased that Pastor Wilck's surgeries went well and that he is healthy and back with us as our spiritual leader. His preaching style of coming down and conversing with us in the aisles has been very effective and well received. If you haven't been to church in a while, stop in and be rejuvenated by his sermons!
- 3. Behind the scenes, the Finance Committee has completed some major changes to the financial reporting process so that there are clear and concise monthly reports for Council. A big thank you to Deb Ciccone, Rod Potter, and other Finance Committee members who worked on this.
- 4. The Council and the congregation recently approved by law and dedicated fund changes so that some former Reformation Church dedicated funds are now available for Our Saviour ministry initiatives. As of this writing, this means an additional \$84,000.
- 5. I am quite pleased on how the congregation has responded to our outreach initiatives. We had a successful Food Ministry Drive in February and raised over \$1200 in April for Sister Maggie's summer camp program. Thanks to everyone who donated to both of those initiatives. We will be sending Sister Maggie the \$1200 this month—this will help several of our younger brothers and sisters in Christ in the Joseph Avenue neighborhood enjoy summer camp.
- 6. Our PB&J program of making 200 sandwiches once a month is now a great opportunity for fellowship for Our Saviour volunteers and additionally helps those in the Brown Street neighborhood get a nutritious sandwich on a day when the St. Peter's Kitchen does not provide a hot lunch. We regularly have a dozen Our Saviour volunteers each month and it takes less than an hour for us to make these sandwiches.

Most of our sandwich makers have traveled to St. Peter's Kitchen to see the operation and to have the same hot lunch that is made available to neighborhood residents. All were impressed with the operation and the food.

I am looking for additional opportunities on how we can support St. Peter's Kitchen. Stay tuned Be safe. Enjoy your summer with your family and friends. See you in church soon!
