From The Desk of Pastor Wilck



Brothers and Sister,

I'd like to begin by thanking you for your prayers, cards and well wishes during my time of recuperation. While it is taking a little longer than I thought it would, I do anticipate being with you on the first Sunday in May.

As we shortly end the Easter cycle in our church year I am struck by the fact that we will be entering Pentecost. Pentecost is the season where the Holy Spirit goes to work within the life of the church.



Beginning with that first Pentecost Sunday, the Holy Spirit fills the disciples to do new things.

What strikes me as interesting is that the disciples begin to stretch. They could have very easily gone back to their regions in Nazareth and Galilee and proclaimed the gospel there, in their own synagogues, seeking to convert the Jews, which is in some cases they did. However, when the Holy Spirit entered their lives they learned from their past experiences; walking with Jesus, observing the miracles, witnessing the Death and Resurrection, and then they reached out to new communities and new people.


What is instructive here is that the disciples did not get caught in the past but allowed the past to inform their future. The word of God went out with power not only to Jews, but to an entire gentile community. Now, in today's world there are over a billion Christians. Just think how little they could have accomplished if they only talked amongst themselves, to the Jewish community and the regions of Galilee and Jerusalem. Instead, because God planted that spirit in their hearts the entire gentile community as well as the Jews learned of who Jesus was, what his mission was, and how his salvation was for all. That is great good news.

As I thought about that I thought about the implications for us as the church. So often we get caught up in our own past so much so that we want to repeat the same things over and over. And certainly some things bear repeating, but not everything. I believe Albert Einstein said, "the definition of insanity is doing the same thing over and over and expecting a different result." Maybe it's time to allow the Holy Spirit to dwell in our hearts and open them to different ways of thinking, to different people, to different ways of doing things. We might be just as surprised as the disciples were when they baptized 5000 in one day.

As your Pastor for 20 years I realize that we have done some things over and over and done them well. We've also tried a few new things but maybe it's time to allow the Holy Spirit to dwell in us a little deeper. Maybe it's time to open ourselves up to new possibilities and in so doing, we may be just as surprised as the disciples were in what they could accomplish through faith and the Holy Spirit. Indeed, the spirit of God is upon us and he calls us to do good things and I challenge you and myself to join hands to do them.




Here at Our Saviour our Members come in all shapes and sizes.

Camp Joy


