From The Desk of Pastor Wilck



One of the things I find very interesting is that we often have long and varied discussions about the purpose of music in the church, I'd like to spend a little time reflecting on that with you.

In Colossians 3:16 Paul gives 2 purposes of music for an assembly of believers:

- 1. "...singing... With thankfulness in your hearts to God" (Col.3:16) "Paul and Silas were praying and singing hymns to God" (Acts 16;25-26). "...Singing and making melody to the Lord" (Eph. 5:19)
- 2. to teach and admonish the listener/singer through the word: "...teaching and admonishing one another in all wisdom, singing..." (Col. 3:16). "...addressing or speaking to one another in psalm...(Eph. 5:19).



While scholars are divided as to the exact translation of Colossians 3:16, Paul is undoubtedly urging the church to use music as a means of teaching and admonishing believers through the word. New Testament Scholar Douglas Moo concludes that, "Paul wants the community to teach and admonish each other by means of various kinds of songs, and he wants them to do this, singing to God with hearts full of gratitude."

As we evaluate this verse, we should note that Paul used this same concept earlier in his epistle apart from music, "we proclaim him, admonishing every man and teaching every man with all wisdom, so that we may present every man complete in Christ (Col. 1:28). Teaching and admonishing is an essential task for the New Testament church—so essential that our music must align with this purpose.

To be clear, based on Paul's teachings in these passages, I am suggesting that music has the same purpose in the church as preaching and teaching: to proclaim the gospel of Christ and to clarify biblical truths. Since his approach is different than what we're used to, there may be fear that this philosophy may detract from the verbalization of God's truth through preaching and teaching. However, this approach gives direction and purpose to our singing and unifies the goals of preaching teaching and singing.

As we unify these goals, we cease to have a, "song service," followed by a, "preaching service." Instead we have a unified worship service that proclaims the gospel and imparts truth to worshippers.

Teaching and admonishing of music means whenever we sing, we are teaching something. Therefore, there are songs that we will do, and there are those that we can't do.

We need to give thought to how this portion of the gathering worship aligns with the preached word such that both aspects of the service accomplish the same goal.

Content is primary, there will and should be a variety of music with no one style mandated. Our primary criterion for song selection is not what meets our taste, but what best imparts the scriptures.

I have often been asked: Pastor how best can I pray? I ran across this little nugget written by Origin of Alexandria who lived from 185 to 254 AD. It is a little treatise entitled: **On Prayer.**

"It seems to me that 4 subjects, which I have found here and there throughout the scriptures, may be outlined and that everyone should form their prayers accordingly. The subjects are these.

At the beginning and preamble of the prayer, so far as possible, God is to be glorified, through Christ glorified together with him, in the Holy Spirit hymned together with him.




And next in order after this, each one must offer general Thanksgiving including blessings bestowed on many besides himself, together with those he has personally obtained from God.

After Thanksgiving, it seems to me that one ought to accuse himself bitterly before God of personal sins, and then ask God 1st for healing to be delivered of the habit that causes one to sin; And secondly for forgiveness of the past period after confession.

It seems to me that in the fourth place one should add a request for great and heavenly things, one's own general, and also for ones family and dearest friends.

Finally, bring the prayer to a close glorifying God through Christ in the Holy Spirit. Having begun by glorifying God, it is fitting to conclude and bring the prayer to an end by glorifying him, hymning and glorifying the Father of the universe.

A Stewardship Program for Our Congregation





"Because of God's Great Mercy," is the title of our stewardship emphasis this year. The scriptural basis of this focus on our stewardship of all that God has entrusted into our care is: 1 Peter 2:9, "But you are a chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, God's own people, in order that you may proclaim the mighty acts of him who called you out of darkness and into his marvelous light."

We begin by proclaiming all that God has done for us, hence the title, "Because of God's Great Mercy." God has made us God's own people. We will also consider how generous giving is an important part of every Christian's life, and how our combined generosity can make even greater things possible through our congregation.

We will think together about how our giving to Our Saviour is an important part of our Christian faith, and how Our Saviour uses our offerings to do God's work within the congregations walls, in our community, and around the world.

"Because of God's Great Mercy," will ask you to do two things. First, you will be asked to increase your giving to Our Saviour by at least 1/2 of %1 of your household income. Second, you will be asked to consider using an automatic funds transfer program that Our Saviour already has in place for your giving.

"Because of God's Great Mercy," will use mail, email, and time in worship to share information with you. Please make a special effort to watch for material during this important time in our congregation's life.



Operation Christmas Child submitted by Lois Dannenberg









A Change of Season: Looking Ahead to Advent





One of the joys of directing music and helping craft liturgy is in the preparing for a change of liturgical season. The church cleverly divides the year into sections or seasons.

- Advent: A four-week period of preparation before Christmas
- Christmas: A season that recalls the birth of Jesus Christ
- Lent: A six-week period of penitent reflection before Easter
- Holy Week: that part of the Church's year that recalls the suffering, death, and resurrection of Jesus
- Easter: A 50-day period of celebration of Jesus' resurrection and the sending forth of the Holy Spirit
- The Time after Epiphany (in some churches referred to as 'Ordinary Time'): A period of time after Christmas and Easter when the faithful consider Jesus' teachings and works
- Pentecost: The final season of the church, which lasts around six months

Each liturgical season has its own mood or vibe. Each has its own colors which are shown in the paraments (or tapestries) that adorn the sanctuary. The modes and keys of the hymns as well as the texts change too. Right now we are in the process of looking ahead to the season of Advent which seems like a long way off, but it begins in 2 months. There are many things to consider. What hymns will we use for our Advent wreath lighting? What setting will we use for the liturgical parts of the service? In place of the "gloria," which is sung before the gospel, it is traditional to substitute a different text of praise. What kind of mood do we want to bring to our service by the choices we make in terms of the service music like: Holy, Holy, the Lamb of God, etc.

Man y of these choices are set, the color of Advent is traditionally blue. Pastor Wilck and I have been discussing what mood we want to convey this coming Advent through our liturgical choices. We invite you to join this discussion by attending our next Worship Committee Meeting: October 10th at 10:30 a.m.
