



Why we will celebrate Communion every Sunday

• Background: The meanings of Holy Communion are rich and varied, as is the history of its celebration among Christians. In, *Using Evangelical Lutheran Worship: The Sunday Assembly*, the author reminds us of the New Testament origins of such a holy meal: both Jesus' last supper as recorded in the Gospels of Mark, Matthew and Luke, and in Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. In addition to these oft-cited "proofs" for this sacrament, "the church comes into existence as a meal-fellowship (Acts 2:42, 46; 1 Cor. 11:17-22), in which the thanksgiving, eating, and drinking are the very place where the community discovers that the crucified one is risen (Luke 24:28-35, 41-43; Acts 10:41; John 21:1-14" (*The Sunday Assembly*, p. 30). The early church came to understand themselves as Jesus' followers "in the breaking of the bread" (Luke 24:35).



When an assembly that does not celebrate weekly communion moves toward this practice, they are, therefore, rediscovering what was essential to the first Christians.1 This reason may not be compelling enough for some: doing something ancient is not necessarily better. This meal, however, is central to our identity as Lutherans and a mark of unity with other Christians who are also practicing more frequent communion. The ELCA's statement on word and sacrament, The Use of the Means of Grace, follows the counsel of the Lutheran confessions, stating:

"According to the Apology of the Augsburg Confession, Lutheran congregations celebrate Holy Communion every Sunday and festival. This confession remains the norm for our practice (UMG, Principle 35)."

The Sunday Assembly treats the early Christian writings that record the early meal practice of Christians as well as the meanings and history for the loss of this practice in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries.

The Church celebrates the Holy Communion frequently because the Church needs the sacrament, the means by which the church's fellowship is established and its mission as the baptized people of God is nourished and sustained...We continue to need, "consistent pastoral encouragement and instruction relating to Holy Communion...pointing up Christ's command, his promise, and our deep need."

As a congregation, beginning the first Sunday in September we will be celebrating Holy Communion every week. The above statement from the ELCA worship resources page tells us why we do this every week. Over the past three Sundays, I have been preaching about Jesus' command to eat his flesh and drink his blood, as recorded in the Gospel of John. This undergirds Jesus' command that as a community we gather around the sacrament to strengthen our faith, remind us that our sins are forgiven, And because of his death and resurrection we are the recipients of eternal life.

In practice we will receive communion by intinction on the first and third Sundays of the month, and the second and fourth Sundays are as we normally receive it with the small communion cups.

From the ELA statement: with infrequent celebrations of Holy Communion, preparation tends to focus mostly on repentance and the forgiveness of sin. With frequent celebrations, people find that the body of Christ sustains them through a variety of experiences. Joy, grief, hope, repentance, Thanksgiving, anxiety, and other aspects of life are all met with the grace of God in Jesus Christ made present in bread and wine.

Thank you to everyone who continues to donate food items throughout the year. There is always a need for food year-round.



Orders will be taken on September 8th before and after the service. There are lots of items available to order including nice coffees and chocolates. Equal Exchange's mission is to build long-term trade partnerships that are economically just and environmentally sound, to foster mutually beneficial relationships between farmers and consumers and to demonstrate, through our success, the contribution of worker co-operatives and Fair Trade to a more equitable, democratic and sustainable world.

The quality of the items you can purchase is very good and they are **not made in China**.

Equal Exchange started with an idea: what if food could be traded in a way that is honest and fair, a way that empowers both farmers and consumers? Our founders - Rink Dickinson, Jonathan Rosenthal and Michael Rozyne - asked this question as they envisioned a trade model that values each part of the supply chain. They decided to take a big risk and started importing fairly traded coffee from Nicaragua in 1986, despite a US embargo against the Sandinista government. A new business was born from this bold act of solidarity with Latin American farmers and Equal Exchange grew from there.
