

In Today's Liturgy

Today's gospel starts with disciples obsessing over who will be closest to Jesus, leading to Jesus teaching his followers how the power structure works in God's Kingdom. Here Jesus makes it clear that there is no cast system in heaven, where wielding power over others is what makes you great. When we pray, "your kingdom come," we are praying for an end to the tyranny and oppression of this world, and accepting how things will be in the next. We pray this gathered around the cross, a sign of great shame transformed to be the sign of great honor and service.

us to follow in the way of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

Pastor: God promises to forgive our iniquity and to remember our sin no more. By


grace you have been saved. In the name of + Jesus Christ, the source of

Prayer of the Day

Pastor: Let us pray.

All: Sovereign God, you turn your greatness into goodness for all the peoples on earth. Shape us into willing servants of your kingdom, and make us desire always and only your will, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

The First Reading: Isaiah 53:4-12

Lector:

This reading is from the last of four passages in Isaiah that are often called "servant songs." Christians are probably most familiar with this servant song. In light of Christian faith, the servant's healing ministry and redemptive suffering are understood to be fulfilled in the life and death of Christ.

A reading from the book of Isaiah.

Surely he has borne our infirmities and carried our diseases; yet we accounted him stricken, struck down by God, and afflicted. But he was wounded for our transgressions, crushed for our iniquities; upon him was the punishment that made us whole, and by his bruises we are healed. All we like sheep have gone astray; we have all turned to our own way, and the Lord has laid on him the iniquity of us all.

He was oppressed, and he was afflicted, yet he did not open his mouth; like a lamb that is led to the slaughter, and like a sheep that before its shearers is silent, so he did not open his mouth. By a perversion of justice he was taken away. Who could have imagined his future? For he was cut off from the land of the living, stricken for the transgression of my people. They made his grave with the wicked and his tomb with the rich, although he had done no violence, and there was no deceit in his mouth.

Yet it was the will of the Lord to crush him with pain. When you make his life an offering for sin, he shall see his offspring, and shall prolong his days; through him the will of the Lord shall prosper. Out of his anguish he shall see light; he shall find satisfaction through his knowledge. The righteous one, my servant, shall make many righteous, and he shall bear their iniquities. Therefore I will allot him a portion with the great, and he shall divide the spoil with the strong; because he poured out himself to death, and was numbered with the transgressors; yet he bore the sin of many, and made intercession for the transgressors.

Lector: The word of the Lord

Psalm 91:9-16

Lector: Because you have made the Lord your refuge, and the Most High your

habitation,

All: no evil will befall you, nor shall affliction come near your dwelling.

Lector: For God will give the angels charge over you, to guard you in all your ways.

All: Upon their hands they will bear you up, lest you strike your foot against a

stone.

Lector: You will tread upon the lion cub and viper; you will trample down the lion and

the serpent.

All: I will deliver those who cling to me; I will uphold them, because they know my

name.

Lector: They will call me, and I will answer them; I will be with them in trouble;

I will rescue and honor them.

All: With long life will I satisfy them, and show them my salvation.

The Second Reading: Hebrews 5:1-10

Lector:

Using imagery from scripture and from Jewish worship practices, Jesus is presented as the great high priest who was obedient to God's saving plan. Through his suffering and death he has become the source of eternal salvation.

A reading from Paul's Letter to the Hebrews.

Every high priest chosen from among mortals is put in charge of things pertaining to God on their behalf, to offer gifts and sacrifices for sins. He is able to deal gently with the ignorant and wayward, since he himself is subject to weakness; and because of this he must offer sacrifice for his own sins as well as for those of the people. And one does not presume to take this honor, but takes it only when called by God, just as Aaron was.

So also Christ did not glorify himself in becoming a high priest, but was appointed by the one who said to him, "You are my Son, today I have begotten you"; as he says also in another place,

"You are a priest forever, according to the order of Melchizedek." In the days of his flesh, Jesus offered up prayers and supplications, with loud cries and tears, to the one who was able to save him from death, and he was heard because of his reverent submission. Although he was a Son, he learned obedience through what he suffered; and having been made perfect, he became the source of eternal salvation for all who obey him, having been designated by God a high priest according to the order of Melchizedek.

Lector: The Word of the Lord. All: Thanks be to God.

The Gospel Reading: Mark 10:35-45

Pastor: The Holy Gospel of Our Lord According to St. Mark.

All: Glory to you, O Lord.

Pastor:

James and John, the sons of Zebedee, came forward to him and said to him, "Teacher, we want you to do for us whatever we ask of you." And he said to them, "What is it you want me to do for you?" And they said to him, "Grant us to sit, one at your right hand and one at your left, in your glory." But Jesus said to them, "You do not know what you are asking. Are you able to drink the cup that I drink, or be baptized with the baptism that I am baptized with?" They replied, "We are able." Then Jesus said to them, "The cup that I drink you will drink; and with the baptism with which I am baptized, you will be baptized; but to sit at my right hand or at my left is not mine to grant, but it is for those for whom it has been prepared."

When the ten heard this, they began to be angry with James and John. So Jesus called them and said to them, "You know that among the Gentiles those whom they recognize as their rulers lord it over them, and their great ones are tyrants over them. But it is not so among you; but whoever wishes to become great among you must be your servant, and whoever wishes to be first among you must be slave of all. For the Son of Man came not to be served but to serve, and to give his life a ransom for many."

The Apostles' Creed

saving grace you freely give, both now and forever. Amen.



Pastor: Amen, and amen.



For to His angels He's given a command to guard you in all of your ways; Upon their hands they will bear you up, lest you dash your foot against a stone.



All: Amen.


